(7) Briefly explain the regulation in clear and nontechnical language. (100 words or less)

The current regulations at 37 Pa. Code Chapters 65, 69 and 77 set forth the authority of the Pennsylvania Parole Board (“the board”) regarding the supervision of state parolees, special probationers and special parolees. In 2021, the General Assembly enacted Act 59 which transferred the powers and duties of parole supervision from the board to the Department of Corrections (“the department”). Therefore, the board is rescinding the portion of its regulations related to parole supervision and the department is amending its regulations to add Chapters 98, 99, 100 and 101 to reflect the statutory transfer of authority.

(8) State the statutory authority for the regulation. Include specific statutory citation.

The act of June 30, 2021 (P.L. 0260, No. 59) transferred the powers and duties of parole supervision from the board to the department. This statutory transfer of authority subsequently caused the need for the board's regulations in Chapters 65, 69 and 77 to be rescinded and reserved, as the regulatory authority for these chapters now falls outside of the jurisdiction of the board. By extension, the statutory transfer of authority of the powers and duties of parole supervision necessitates that the department promulgate Chapters 98, 99, 100, and 101 to replace the rescinded regulations and to assure continuity of operations.

This final-omitted rulemaking is further authorized by 61 Pa.C.S. § 6111(e) (relating to Pennsylvania Parole Board), which provides the board with the powers and duties generally vested in and imposed upon independent administrative boards; and by 61 Pa.C.S. § 6141 (relating to general rules and special regulations), which provides the board with the power to make general rules and to prescribe special regulations for particular persons. In addition, section 506 of the Administrative Code of 1929 (71 P.S. § 186) empowers the heads of all administrative departments and boards to prescribe rules and regulations, not inconsistent with law, for the government of their respective departments or boards, the conduct of their employees and clerks, the distribution and performance of their business, and the custody, use and preservations of records and documents under their authority.

Further, 61 Pa.C.S. § 6171(a)(12) (relating to powers and duties of department) authorizes the department to adopt regulations establishing criteria for department acceptance of cases for supervision and presentence investigations from counties that on December 31, 1985, maintained adult probation offices and parole systems. Additionally, 61 Pa.C.S. § 6171(a)(21) authorizes the department to adopt regulations establishing specific composition, functions and responsibilities for citizens advisory committees and to receive reports, recommendations or other input concerning parole policies and parole-related concerns from the committees on a regular basis

Additionally, section 204(3) of the act of July 31, 1968 (P.L. 769, No. 240)(45 P.S. § 1204(3)), known as the Commonwealth Documents Law (CDL), authorizes publication of a final-omitted rulemaking when public notice and public comment are impracticable, unnecessary or contrary to public interest.

The regulations are not mandated by any federal or state law or court order, or federal regulation. There are no relevant state or federal court decisions pertaining to the regulations.

(10) State why the regulation is needed. Explain the compelling public interest that justifies the regulation. Describe who will benefit from the regulation. Quantify the benefits as completely as possible and approximate the number of people who will benefit.

The board's action to rescind and reserve Chapters 65, 69 and 77 and the department's action to amend to add Chapters 98, 99, 100 and 101 are needed because the powers and duties of parole supervision transferred to the department under Act 59. The changes will serve the public interest by ensuring that the regulations of the board and the department accurately reflect the statutory authorities under the law.

(11) Are there any provisions that are more stringent than federal standards? If yes, identify the specific provisions and the compelling Pennsylvania interest that demands stronger regulations.

There are no federal standards governing the supervision of state parolees and probationers in this Commonwealth. As such, there are no provisions that are more stringent than federal standards.

(12) How does this regulation compare with those of the other states? How will this affect Pennsylvania's ability to compete with other states?

The regulations are Commonwealth specific. The regulations have no effect on Pennsylvania's ability to compete with other states. A review of contiguous states indicates that most have a parole system that is similar to the one enacted by Act 59 of 2021, as follows:

In Ohio, the Adult Parole Authority (APA) is the section within the Division of Parole and Community Services within the Ohio Department of Rehabilitation & Correction that is responsible for the release and supervision of adult parolees returning to local communities from prison, as well as assisting some Courts of Common Pleas with supervision duties. See Chapters 5149 and 2967 of the Ohio Revised Code.

In New Jersey, the New Jersey State Parole Board's Division of Parole is responsible for the supervision of more than 15,000 offenders statewide. Parole officers work within the Division of Parole. See the Parole Act of 1979 (N.J.S.A. 30:4-123.45 to 123.69). This statutory scheme is similar to the scheme in the Commonwealth prior to the enactment of Act 59 of 2021.

In New York, the New York State Department of Corrections and Community Supervision (DOCCS) administers the parole system and supervises parolees, while the New York State Board of Parole oversees the parole process and makes decisions regarding the release of individuals in prison, similar to parole supervision in the Commonwealth under Act 59. See NY Corrections Laws, Chapter 43, Articles 2 (Department of Corrections and Community Supervision) and 8 (Community Supervision), as well as NY Executive Laws, Chapter 18, Article 12-B (State Board of Parole).

Maryland's Department of Public Safety and Correctional Services, Division of Parole and Probation supervises individuals on mandatory release, parole and probation. The Maryland Parole Commission is responsible for determining whether incarcerated individuals are suitable for release into the community under certain conditions or supervision. This scheme is similar to that under Act 59. See Md. Code, Correctional Services, Title 6 §§ 6-101—6.215 (Parole and Probation) and Title 7 §§ 7-101 – 7-805 (Parole, Release on Mandatory Supervision, and Executive Clemency).

In Delaware, the parole system is similar to that under act 59. The Delaware Board of Parole conducts hearings and makes decisions about whether to grant parole to adult offenders committed to the state prison system. Since 1964, the Delaware Department of Corrections has been responsible for

supervision of parolees through their Division of Probation and Parole. See 11 Del.C. §§ 4301-4394).

In West Virginia, the WV Department of Homeland Security's Division of Corrections & Rehabilitation's Parole Services is responsible for the supervision of all West Virginia parolees, out-of-state parolees, and out-of-state probationers, while the West Virginia Parole Board is responsible for making parole decisions and it also makes clemency recommendations to the Governor for adult offenders. This system is also similar to the Commonwealth's system under Act 59. See W. Va. Code, Chapter 62, Article 12 (Probation and Parole) and Chapter 15A, Article 7 (Bureau of Community Corrections).

(13) Will the regulation affect any other regulations of the promulgating agency or other state agencies? If yes, explain and provide specific citations.

The changes in the regulations will not affect other state agencies or other regulations of the Board or the Department. However, the Board is undertaking a separate proposed rulemaking to update its remaining regulations.

(14) Describe the communications with and solicitation of input from the public, any advisory council/group, small businesses and groups representing small businesses in the development and drafting of the regulation. No communication with or input from the public was considered in proposing the rescission or amendments. Solicitation of input was unnecessary because this rulemaking merely transfers the relevant provisions from the Board's regulations in Chapters 65, 67 and 77 in Part II (relating to Board of Probation and Parole) to Chapters 98, 99 and 100 in Part III, Subpart B. (relating to Department of Corrections); and replicates, with minor edits, the Board's confidentiality provision from § 61.2 (relating to confidentiality of records) in Chapter 101 (relating to confidentiality of records) to assure continuity of operations.

(15) Identify the types and number of persons, businesses, small businesses (as defined in Section 3 of the Regulatory Review Act, Act 76 of 2012) and organizations which will be affected by the regulation. How are they affected?

These regulations will affect parole staff, citizen advisory committees, and individuals who are under the supervision of state parole supervision in this Commonwealth by requiring them to follow the requirements of the Department.

There are approximately 626 case load carrying parole agents, 17 training parole agents, and 23 reentry parole agents employed by the Department. All parole agents assigned to perform field work are eligible to carry a firearm.

There are Citizen Advisory Committees in each of Pennsylvania's ten parole districts, and each committee has approximately seven to 15 members.

As of December 2025, there were approximately 21,003 individuals under State parole supervision, 4,730 individuals on special probation, 805 individuals on special parole, and 2,808 individuals being supervised on probation or parole for other states.

There are no costs or adverse effects associated with this rulemaking. The proposed regulations simply seek to accurately reflect the statutory changes made by Act 59 of 2021 and ensure the provisions from Act 59 assigned to the Board and the Department are properly reflected in the respective agencies' regulations.

TRANSFER OF AUTHORITY OF PAROLE SUPERVISION

The Pennsylvania Parole Board (the board) rescinds and reserves 37 Pa. Code Chapters 65, 69 and 77 (relating to conditions governing special probation and parole; parole agents; and citizens advisory committees), as set forth in Annex A. The Department of Corrections (the department) amends its regulations to add 37 Pa. Code Chapters 98, 99, 100 and 101 to read as set forth in Annex B.

Statutory Authority

This final-omitted rulemaking is required as a result of the enactment of the act of June 30, 2021 (P.L. 260, No. 59) (Act 59) which transferred the powers and duties of parole supervision from the board to the department. This statutory transfer of authority subsequently caused the need for the board's regulations in Chapters 65, 69 and 77 to be rescinded and reserved, as the regulatory authority for these chapters now falls outside of the jurisdiction of the board. By extension, the statutory transfer of authority of the powers and duties of parole supervision necessitates that the department promulgate Chapters 98, 99, 100, and 101 to replace the rescinded regulations and to assure continuity of operations.

This final-omitted rulemaking is further authorized by 61 Pa.C.S. § 6111(e) (relating to Pennsylvania Parole Board), which provides the board with the powers and duties generally vested in and imposed upon independent administrative boards: and by 61 Pa.C.S. § 6141 (relating to general rules and special regulations), which provides the board with the power to

make general rules and to prescribe special regulations for particular persons. Omission of Proposed Rule Making

Public notice of the board's intention to rescind and reserve Chapters 65, 69 and 77 and the department's intention to adopt Chapters 98, 99, 100 and 101 under the procedures set forth in sections 201 and 202 of the CDL (45 P.S. §§ 1201 and 1202) were omitted as authorized under section 204(3) of the CDL. The board and the department find that public notice and comment are impracticable and unnecessary under the circumstances because the enabling authority at 61

Pa.C.S.(relating to the Prisons and Parole Code) was amended by Act 59, which transferred the authority to supervise parole from the board to the department. This rulemaking merely transfers the relevant provisions from the board's regulations in Chapters 65, 67 and 77 in Part II (relating to Board of Probation and Parole) to Chapters 98, 99 and 100 in Part III, Subpart B. (relating to Department of Corrections); and replicates, with minor edits, the board's confidentiality provision from § 61.2 (relating to confidentiality of records) in Chapter 101 (relating to confidentiality of records) to assure continuity of operations.

Purpose and Background

In 2021, the General Assembly enacted Act 59 which formally transferred the powers and duties of the supervision of offenders from the board to the department. As a result, the board maintained its exclusive and independent decision-making role with regard to the parole decision and parole recommitment process but all parole supervision staff and authorities relating to community supervision of state parolees, special probationers and special parolees were transferred to the department.

Regarding parole supervision generally, Act 59 modified the language in 61 Pa.C.S. § 6111(a) to modify the board's powers and duties. Prior to Act 59, section 6111(a) stated that "the Pennsylvania Parole Board is an independent administrative board for the administration of the parole laws of this Commonwealth." Act 59 amended the language in section 6111(a) and now sets forth that "[t]he Pennsylvania Parole Board is established as an independent administrative board for the purpose of granting and revoking paroles to certain offenders within this Commonwealth." With respect to the department, Act 59 granted the department the authority "to supervise any offender released on parole by order of the board and to arrest, to detain in a department facility and to report to the board for a final determination whether to revoke parole

and recommit an offender who fails to comply with the conditions of supervision, including, but not limited to, the alleged commission of a new crime.” See 61 Pa.C.S. § 6171(a)(1). Act 59 also provided the department with the power and duty to enforce conditions of state parole supervision established by the board as well as the power to impose and enforce additional conditions of supervision on an offender. See 61 Pa.C.S. § 6171(a)(2).

Regarding special parole, prior to the enactment of Act 59, 61 Pa.C.S. § 6132(a)(2)(i) (relating to specific powers of board involving parolees) formerly provided the board the power “to supervise any person placed on parole, when sentenced to a maximum period of less than two years, by any judge of a court having criminal jurisdiction, when the court may by special order direct supervision by the board, in which case the parole case shall be known as a special case....” . Act 59 deleted section 6132 (a)(2)(i) and with it the board’s power to supervise special parole. That power was transferred to the department by providing at 61 Pa.C.S § 6171(a)(4) that the department has the power and duty “to supervise any offender placed on parole, when sentenced to a maximum period of less than two years, by any judge of a court having criminal jurisdiction when the court may by special order direct supervision by the department, in which case the parole case shall be known as a special case....”

Regarding special probation, Act 59 rescinded from the board the power to supervise any person placed on special probation and conduct presentence investigations when requested to do so by the court, which authority was previously located at 61 Pa.C.S. § 6133 (relating to probation services) (repealed) and transferred that authority to the department at 61 Pa. C.S. § 6172 (relating to probation services).

Regarding citizens advisory committees, Act 59 removed from the board the power to establish, administer and adopt regulations regarding citizens advisory committees previously located at 61

Pa.C.S. § 6131(a)(6) (deleted) and transferred that authority to the department at 61 Pa.C.S. § 6171(a)(21).

Regarding the ability to adopt regulations pertaining to acceptance of special probation and parole supervision, Act 59 rescinded from the board the power to adopt regulations establishing the criteria for the acceptance of cases for parole and probation supervision and presentence investigations previously located at 61 Pa.C.S. § 6131(a)(7) (deleted) and transferred that authority to the department at 61 Pa.C.S. § 6171(a)(12).

Regarding the confidentiality of records, section 506 of the Administrative Code of 1929 (71 P.S. § 186) allows the heads of all administrative departments and boards, among other things, to prescribe rules and regulations for the custody, use and preservation of the records, books, documents and property pertaining to their department and boards. Additionally, 61 Pa.C.S. § 6141 provides the Board with the authority to make rules and regulations for the conduct and supervision of offenders, which implicitly includes the ability to create rules and regulations regarding the records for offenders under probation and parole supervision. Thus, when section 27 of Act 59 transferred to the department the functions, powers and duties relating to the supervision of parole and probation offenders, it included all records and files previously in the board's possession in connection with those functions. Specifically, the private and confidential nature of those records that were previously established by § 61.2 followed with these records and files to the department.

Therefore, the board is rescinding and reserving Chapters 65, 69 and 77 because the underlying statutory authority has been transferred to the department. The department is amending its regulations to include Chapters 98, 99, 100 and 101 to reflect the authority granted to it by Act 59.

Description of Final-Omitted Regulations

The final-omitted rulemaking seeks to rescind and reserve the regulations of the board at Chapters 65, 69, and 77 and add Chapters 98, 99, 100, and 101 to the regulations of the department, as set forth in Annex A and Annex B, due to amended statutory authority.

Reporting, Recordkeeping and Paperwork Requirements

This final-omitted rulemaking will not result in any reporting, recordkeeping or paperwork requirements for the board and the department, individuals or entities.

Fiscal Impact

This final-omitted rulemaking will not result in any fiscal impact to the Commonwealth, its political subdivisions or the general public.

Sunset Date

There is no sunset date for this final-omitted rulemaking.

Effective Date

This final-omitted rulemaking will take effect upon publication in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*.

Regulatory Review

Under section 5.1(c) of the Regulatory Review Act (71 P.S. § 745.5a(c)) on [DATE], the board and the department submitted a copy of the final-omitted rulemaking and a copy of the Regulatory Analysis Form to the Independent Regulatory Review Commission (IRRC) and to the chairpersons of the Judiciary Committee of the Senate and the chairpersons of the Judiciary Committee of the House of Representatives.

On the same day, the final-omitted rulemaking was submitted to the Office of Attorney General for review and approval under the Commonwealth Attorneys Act (71 P.S. §§ 732-101— 732-506).

Under section 5.1(j.2) of the Regulatory Review Act, the rulemaking was deemed approved by the Judiciary Committees of the Senate and the House of Representatives on [DATE]. Under section 5.1(e) of the Regulatory Review Act, IRRC met on [DATE], and approved the final-omitted rulemaking.

Findings

The board and the department find that:

- (a) Final-omitted rulemaking is permitted when procedures specified in sections 201 and 202 of the Commonwealth Documents Law (CDL) (45 P.S. §§ 1201 and 1202) are impracticable, unnecessary or contrary to the public interest. See 45 P.S. § 1204(3).
- (b) Public notice and solicitation of public comment was properly omitted as impracticable and unnecessary under the circumstances because the enabling authority for the regulations was amended and transferred the powers and duties of parole supervision from the board to the department.

Order

The board and the department, acting under the authority of 61 Pa.C.S. Chapter 61 (relating to the Prisons and Parole Code), and section 204(3) of the CDL, order that:

(1) The regulations of the board at 37 Pa. Code Chapters 65, 69, and 77 are rescinded and reserved and the regulations of the department at 37 Pa. Code Chapters 98, 99, 100, and 101 are added to read as set forth in Annexes A and B.

(2) The board and the department shall submit this final-omitted rulemaking to the Office of General Counsel and the Office of Attorney General for approval as to form and legality as required by law.

(3) The board and the department shall submit this final-omitted rulemaking to IRRC and to the Judiciary Committees of the Senate and House of Representatives as required by law.

(4) The board and the department shall certify this final-omitted rulemaking and deposit it with the Legislative Reference Bureau as required by law.

(5) This final-omitted rulemaking shall take effect immediately upon publication in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*.

SUBPART B. DEPARTMENT OF CORRECTIONS

CHAPTER 98. CONDITIONS GOVERNING SPECIAL PROBATION AND PAROLE

§ 98.1. Department acceptance of cases.

Acceptance of a case for supervision or presentence investigation from a county which, on December 31, 1985, maintained adult probation offices and parole systems, will be at the Department's discretion. The Department will ordinarily accept a case that meets the following criteria:

(1) For supervision:

(i) A felony conviction and a sentence to serve a probationary term of at least 2 years.

(ii) A felony conviction and parole from a sentence with a balance of at least 6 months.

(iii) A case otherwise under the Department's jurisdiction.

(2) For presentence investigation:

(i) A felony conviction.

(ii) A case otherwise under the Department's jurisdiction.

§ 98.2. Detention and revocation.

The Department may, during the probation or parole period, in case of violation of the conditions of probation or parole, detain the special probationer or parolee in a county prison and make a recommendation to the court, which may result in the revocation of probation or parole and commitment to a penal or correctional institution to serve a sentence in the case of probation or the remainder of the sentence in the case of parole.

§ 98.3. General conditions of special probation or parole.

A special probationer or parolee is subject to the following conditions:

(1) Be under the supervision of a district office or suboffice and not leave that district without prior written permission of the parole supervision staff.

(2) Obtain the written permission of the parole supervision staff before changing the special probationer's or parolee's residence.

(3) Maintain regular contact with the parole supervision staff by:

(i) Reporting regularly as instructed and following written instructions of the Department or the parole supervision staff.

(ii) Notifying the parole supervision staff within 72 hours of any of the following:

(A) Arrest.

(B) Receipt of a summons or citation for an offense punishable by imprisonment upon conviction.

(iii) Notifying the parole supervision staff within 72 hours of a change in status including, but not limited to employment, on-the-job training and education.

(4) Comply with municipal, county, State and Federal criminal statutes, as well as the Vehicle Code (75 Pa.C.S. §§ 101—9910) and the Liquor Code (47 P. S. § § 1-101—1401).

(5) Additionally:

(i) Abstain from the unlawful possession or sale of narcotics and dangerous drugs and abstain from the use of controlled substances within the meaning of the Controlled Substance, Drug, Device and Cosmetic Act (35 P. S. § § 780-101—780.144) without a valid prescription.

(ii) Refrain from owning or possessing firearms or other weapons.

(iii) Refrain from assaultive behavior.

(6) Pay fines, costs and restitution imposed by the sentencing court in accordance with the instructions contained in the Conditions Governing Special Probation/Parole form.

§ 98.4. Special provisions or conditions of sentence.

Every special probationer or parolee shall comply with the following conditions of sentence or, in the case of a parolee, special conditions which will be subsequently imposed by the parolee's parole agent:

(1) If problems arise or questions occur concerning the conditions of probation or parole, the parolee shall consult with the parole agent, as it is the responsibility of the latter to help the parolee in the interpretation of the conditions of probation or parole. If a parolee is unable to contact their parole agent, the parolee should contact the agent in charge of the district parole office.

(2) If a parolee is arrested while on special probation or parole, the Department may place a detainer against the parolee which will prevent the parolee from making bail, pending the disposition of the new charges or other action of the court.

(3) If a parolee is convicted of a crime committed while on special probation, or violates the conditions of probation, the court may revoke probation of and impose sentence upon the parolee.

(4) If a parolee is convicted of a crime committed while on special parole, or violates the conditions of parole, the court may recommit the parolee to serve the balance of the sentence which the parolee was serving when paroled, with no credit given for time at liberty on parole.

§ 98.5. Acknowledgment by parolee.

Every parolee shall acknowledge the following:

(1) That the parolee has read, or has had read to the parolee, the conditions of parole.

(2) That the parolee fully understands the conditions of parole and agrees to follow such conditions.

(3) That the parolee fully understands the penalties involved if the parolee violates the conditions of parole in any manner.

§ 98.6. Parole agreement.

The parole agreement shall contain the parole number, date and signature of the parolee.

If the signature is by mark, there shall be two witnesses to the execution of the parole agreement.

CHAPTER 99. PAROLE AGENTS

§ 99.1. General.

The Department recognizes, in specific cases, the need for parole agents to carry a weapon for their protection. Therefore, parole agents shall be authorized to carry firearms in accordance with established standards and procedures of the Department.

§ 99.2. Limitations.

The authority extended by the provisions of this chapter are limited by the following provisions:

(1) Firearms shall be used only for defensive purposes and may be carried by parole agents only while on duty.

(2) Permission to carry firearms may be given only to those parole agents who have successfully completed a Department-approved and sponsored training course in the use of firearms.

§ 99.3. Procedures.

The following procedures have been adopted by the Department:

(1) Whenever a parole agent considers it necessary to carry a firearm, during that period, it should be carried on the parole agent's person and in a manner that it is ready and available for use. Under no circumstances is the weapon to be left or carried in the glove compartment of an automobile, a briefcase, a suitcase or some receptacle other than on the person of the parole agent. The firearm is to be carried inconspicuously and is to be used only in the defense of the parole agent's person.

(2) Parole agents desiring to carry a firearm shall submit in writing a request to their immediate supervisor.

(3) The request shall include a rationale as to why it is necessary for the parole agent to carry a weapon while on duty.

(4) The immediate supervisor and district supervisor shall then review the request, making a decision with an accompanying statement either in support of or in opposition to the agent's request.

(5) Copies of requests and the final decision concerning the arming of the agents shall be submitted to the regional director and the Deputy Secretary for Parole Field Services for information and review purposes.

CHAPTER 100. CITIZENS ADVISORY COMMITTEES

§ 100.1. Composition. The district director shall appoint at least seven persons to a citizens advisory committee. If possible, the membership of the committee shall include, but not be limited to:

(1) Members of ethnic and minority groups in proportion to their numbers in the district.

(2) A resident of each county within the district.

§ 100.2. Functions and responsibilities.

A citizens advisory committee shall:

(1) Advise the Department of the issues and concerns of the citizens of this Commonwealth regarding probation and parole.

(2) Inform the citizens of this Commonwealth regarding probation and parole and the functions of the Department.

(3) Assist the district staff in discharging their duties.

(4) Review established policies and programs of the Department.

(5) Explore innovative administrative and programmatic ideas.

(6) Develop new resources.

CHAPTER 101. CONFIDENTIALITY OF RECORDS

§ 101. Confidentiality of records.

Records, reports and other written documents and information, evaluations, opinions and voice recordings in the Department's custody or possession concerning a probationer or parolee are private and confidential.
